The Changing Face of BASF Refugees

One thing we can be sure of is that there are many countries where people are persecuted, harassed and threatened with physical harm or death. As wars, conflict and internal political changes occur so the country of origin of those seeing asylum changes, and those we support changes too.

Currently the largest group of refugees come from North Korea, I am sure you have all read the terrible newspaper articles reporting increasing famine and hardship which is forcing people to make a

hazardous and potentially fatal journey to flee the oppressive regime which denies basic human rights. They cannot go to South Korea as there they are viewed as spies or worse.

Some asylum seekers we support do have work visas but they find it impossible to find a job. Many employers are loath to train and employ people who are at risk of being sent back after a short period. Some asylum seekers have been so traumatised from their experiences that they are unable to work.

A Case History: Lee's* Story

Lee comes from the Indian Sub-continent, he escaped his home region because he was involved in opposition party politics, which threatened his life, and even now, after an absence of seven years, his political opponents are still looking for him. His road to security and safety in Australia has been long, arduous and traumatic and his process of application for refugee status has been almost as difficult.

Initially Lee was in detention and on release was fortunate to be supported by two kind and generous Australian women who had met him

when they visited Villawood Detention Centre. They provided him with accommodation and approached BASF for funds to cover his food, transport and phone costs.

Lee has endured four Refugee Review Tribunal (RRT) hearings and three Federal Magistrate Court (FMC) hearings, each takes much preparation and many meetings going over the frightening circumstances he has left behind. Three times a pro bono Barrister took his case to the FMC having found judicial error in the RRT decisions Lee had

received which is the only way the case could be re-examined. After the final RRT hearing Lee had to wait an agonising 12 more months before a decision was made and he was granted a protection visa and BASF could cease supporting him.

At last Lee is able to start a new life in safety and can finally apply for his wife and children who have been in hiding to join him so they can be together again in a safe place.

*Lee's name has been changed to protect his identity as he still fears retribution from his home country.
